**GENERAL INFORMATION**

***Come to a Pre-Nursing Advisement Session or contact the Nursing Department!***

The Associate of Applied Science degree in Nursing is designed to prepare graduates to apply for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) and to function as registered nurses in providing client care at the beginning staff level position. One of NWACC's program outcomes is to prepare nursing graduates who will have the necessary background to continue their professional growth on an individual basis.

**Three tracks are available in the Nursing Program. Approximately 40 students are accepted into Track I each Fall semester. A maximum of 30 students are accepted into Track II each Summer. Refer to the next page for more information about Track II.**

**LPN to RN Transition Track will accept students each Fall Semester. (Refer to a separate information sheet related to the LPN to RN Transition Track).** Students must meet both the NWACC admission criteria, stated in the College Catalog, and the criteria for admission to the Nursing Program (see next page). All Nursing Program applicants must have a high school diploma or G.E.D. College transferable credits need to be evaluated for equivalency to NWACC prerequisites. The Admissions and Records Office completes a Degree Audit upon request.

**\*\*Students wishing to pursue an Associate Degree in Nursing must apply to the Nursing Department. Application forms may be picked up at the Nursing Department, Room 2050, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of Burns Hall at One College Drive, Bentonville, Arkansas. Applications for Summer and Fall will be available on or about February 1<sup>st</sup> each year. Deadline for application completion for the Summer and Fall class is on or about March 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.**

**\*\*The application process is subject to revision.**

Applicants must meet the minimum criteria for either track **by the end of Spring semester of application** in order to be considered eligible for admission into the respective Summer or Fall semester. Some general education classes have prerequisite requirements; please check the *College Catalog* or *Class Schedule* before enrolling.

**After the application deadline, applicants contact the Nursing Office to schedule mandatory testing (TEAS-Test of Essential Academic Skills).** Testing is scheduled in the month of March. Applicants accrue points based on the number of pre/co-requisite courses completed, course grades, and the TEAS score. They are then placed in ranked order. Selection for admission is made by the Nursing Admission Committee in descending order of scores until the class is filled. **A letter informing the applicant of the Committee's decision is mailed in late May for Track II and by mid-June for Track I.** An alternate list is maintained for filling positions that are declined. The alternate list is on file only until the immediate class selection process is completed. **The alternate list is not maintained as a waiting list.**

## MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR TRACK I

Pathway A: Collegiate Credits in General Education (15-plus credit hours, minimal GPA of 2.5)\*

1. **Math requirement** \*:
  - College Algebra (MATH 1204) **or** Survey of College Mathematics (MATH 1103) **or** a higher level math i.e. MATH 1213, MATH 2043, etc.
2. **Science requirements** \* (at least one of the three completed):
  - Anatomy and Physiology I (BIOL 2214) \*\*
  - Anatomy and Physiology II (BIOL 2224) \*\*
  - General Microbiology (MBIO 2014)

\* As prerequisite or corequisite of semester of application.  
\*\* Anatomy & Physiology credit must be no older than 5 years.  
(If A&PI and/or A&PII are older than 5 yrs, consult with the Director of Nursing Education)
3. **General education requirements** (at least seven hours in addition to math/science):
  - English Composition I (ENGL 1013)
  - English Composition II (ENGL 1023)
  - General Psychology (PSYC 2003)
  - Human Growth and Development (PSYC 2103)
  - Intro to Computer Information (CISQ 1103) **or** CISQ Challenge Exam
  - Elective (3 credit hours, college level, transferable)

**\* The Nursing Program will not accept any courses with less than a “C” grade.**

**Many students have found it quite advantageous to complete most of the general education prerequisite courses prior to beginning the Nursing Program.**

Pathway B: Assessment Test Scores in Reading, Writing and Math (Less than 15 credit hours)

**Students interested in this pathway will meet with the Director of Nursing Education before applying to the Nursing Program to review their assessment test scores, i.e. ACT, or COMPASS.** Students being admitted via this pathway must follow the curriculum plan as outlined in the Nursing Degree Sequence. Students must have College Algebra and Anatomy & Physiology I credits prior to Fall entry into the Nursing Program. This is a full-time semester load commitment!

## MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR TRACK II

To be eligible, for Track II, the student must have completed all the general education courses with **at least a “C” or better** by the end of the Spring semester and have an overall Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.5 or better prior to the start of NURS 9108 Fundamentals of Nursing in the Summer.

Students should plan to devote at least 40-50 hours per week to the Nursing Program sequence. Full-time employment during the Nursing Program is strongly discouraged. Track I students should limit outside employment to 20hrs/week or less. Track II students should limit outside employment to 12-15 hours per week or less.

Students entering the Nursing Program are required to have verification of a Tuberculin (PPD) skin test and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) certification through the American Heart Association, Health Care Provider Modules 1-4. It is also recommended that students have current vaccinations for Hepatitis B. The Tuberculin test can be performed at a physician’s office or county health unit. The education department of most area hospitals offers CPR certification classes.

All ESL students seeking admission into program tracks in Health Professions are required to complete the **COMPASS ESL Listening Test**. The **ESL** listening test is a component of the COMPASS test which is a college placement and diagnostic test in mathematics, reading and writing skills in addition to the ESL placement component. Interested students can receive more information and/or schedule to take this test through the NWACC testing center. The ESL listening test is designed to assess a student's ability to understand Standard American English. **A level 4 score is required for ESL students seeking entrance into Health Professions Programs at NWACC**. The level 4 score indicates the ability to understand linguistically complex discussions, including academic lectures and factual reports. **All ESL students seeking career paths in Health Professions scoring below a level 4 are required to meet with the Program Director in their specific Health Professions career track for advisement and assistance in finding resources to enhance this necessary skill.**

**If accepted** into the nursing program, all students must provide the following:

- Proof of Current Physical exam
- Proof of Medical Insurance
- Proof of TB skin test
- Proof of CPR certification
- 9 panel urine drug screen
- Criminal background check

Further information, (including deadline dates) related to all of the above, will be included in the letter of acceptance into the Nursing Program.
