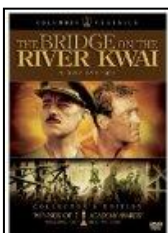
August 21— “Australia (2008) starring Nicole Kidman and Hugh Jackman. Set in northern Australia before World War II, an English aristocrat who inherits a sprawling ranch reluctantly pacts with a stock-man in order to protect her new property from a takeover plot. As the pair drive 2,000 head of cattle over unforgiving landscape, they experience the bombing of Darwin, Australia, by Japanese forces firsthand.”



September 18 — “Around the World in 80 Days (1958). Adaptation of Jules Verne's novel about a Victorian Englishman, Phileas Fogg, who is challenged to prove his contention that a man can go around the world in 80 days. He bets his entire fortune and leaves with a new butler on a world tour. This Victorian adventure has a kicker; the bank of England has been robbed. Is this Fogg's way of avoiding arrest? The detective following him believes so, and his butler is becoming unsure. Star-studded cast includes Sir John Gielgud, David Niven, Shirley MacLaine, Charles Boyer, and Marlene Dietrich.”



October 16 — “Hopscotch (1980) starring Walter Matthau, Glenda Jackson, Ned Beatty, and Sam Waterston. The CIA and the KGB work together to sabotage the literary ambitions of a fired CIA agent who has decided to get even with the organization by publishing a book which outlines years of dirty secrets.”



November 20 — “The Bridge on the River Kwai (1957) After settling his differences with a Japanese POW camp commander, a British colonel co-operates to oversee his men's construction of a railway bridge for their captors, while oblivious to a plan by the Allies to destroy it. Cast includes William Holden, Alec Guinness, and Jack Hawkins.”



December 18 — “Nine to Five (1980) Three female employees (Dolly Parton, Lily Tomlin, and Jane Fonda) of a "sexist, egotistical, lying, hypocritical bigot" find a way to turn the tables on him.” Frank Hart (Dabney Coleman) is a pig. He takes advantage in the grossest manner of the women who work with him. When his three assistants manage to trap him in his own house they assume control of his department and productivity leaps, but just how long can they keep Hart tied up?”



January 15 — “The Trouble with Harry (1955) comedy directed by Alfred Hitchcock starring John Forsythe, Shirley MacLaine, and Mildred Natwick. The trouble with Harry is that he's dead, and everyone seems to have a different idea of what needs to be done with his body.”

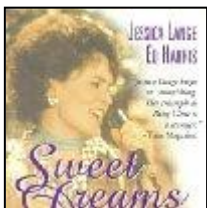
February 19 — “**New in Town** (2005) comedy/romance with Renée Zellweger and Harry Connick, Jr. A high-powered consultant is sent from Miami to a middle of nowhere town in Minnesota to oversee the restructuring of a blue collar manufacturing plant. After enduring a frosty reception from the locals, icy roads and freezing weather, she eventually finds herself being accepted by the community. When she's ordered to close down the plant and put the entire community out of work, she's forced to reconsider her goals and priorities, and finds a way to save the town.”



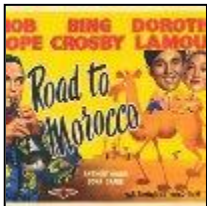
March 19 — “**Paint Your Wagon** (1969) comedy/musical//western starring Lee Marvin, Clint Eastwood, and Jean Seberg. A Michigan farmer and a prospector form a partnership in the California gold country. Their adventures include buying and sharing a wife, hijacking a stage, kidnapping six prostitutes, and turning their mining camp into a boomtown. Along the way there is plenty of drinking, gambling, and singing and even some creative gold mining.”



April 16 — “**Life is Beautiful** (1998) with Roberto Benigni, Nicoletta Braschi, and Giorgio Cantarini. In 1939, Guido, an Italian Jew, falls in love with Dora, who isn't Jewish. He woos her away from the Fascist official she has been dating, and they get married. As the war progresses, Guido and their son Giosue are arrested and taken to a concentration camp. Dora goes too, determined not to separate the family. In the midst of the horrors of the camp, Guido protects his son by pretending that survival in the concentration camp is an elaborate game with which Giosue must play along or be sent home.”



May 21 — “**Sweet Dreams: Patsy Cline Story** (1985) with Jessica Lang and Ed Harris. This story is about the velvet-voiced country singer's rise from poor surroundings, literally forcing her talent on the Nashville establishment, all the while trying to survive an abusive marriage to a drinker. At the top of her career, she died in a tragic plane crash.”



June 18 — “**Road to Morocco** (1942) Jeff (Bing Crosby) and Turkey (Bob Hope), two wild and crazy guys adrift on a raft in the Mediterranean, are cast away on a desert shore and hop a convenient camel to an Arabian Nights city where Turkey soon finds himself sold as a slave to luscious Princess Shalmar of Karameesh (Dorothy Lamour). Naturally, Jeff would like to rescue Turkey from this "dire" fate, even if it means taking his place! But they haven't figured on the virile desert chieftain, who also has designs on the princess.”



July 16 — “**The Importance of Being Earnest** (2002) with Rupert Everett, Colin Firth, Reese Witherspoon, and Judi Dench. Two young gentlemen living in 1890's England use the same pseudonym ("Ernest") on the sly, which is fine until they both fall in love with women using that name, which leads to a comedy of mistaken identities.”
