Section 1 - In what ways did the Program help you "demonstrate engagement," "cultivate curiosity," and "explore perspectives?"

Being a member of the Honors program really improved my college experience. Throughout my years at Northwest Arkansas Community College I was able to better engage myself in our community through taking honors courses, primarily with service-learning projects. I have found that honors courses are also more stimulating than regular ones. Rather than showing up to class to listen to a lecture and do tons of mind-numbing assignments, you are met with really involved instructors that take great pride in their teaching.
