

I feel encouraged and supported, full of excitement and vision.

With Prof. Chesne, I read sublime essays, began writing poetry again, and reengaged with my love of the art of language. The pieces she chose told deep stories through diverse

voices; they were thought-provoking, stimulating, full of curiosities and literary virtuosities. "How to Bartend" by Rabih Alameddin was my favorite, speaking to me as a

friend.



World Civilizations with Professor Gallo was expansive; if we wish to cultivate a healthy humanity, we must know the stories of our shared history! I love her emphasis on food culture, as this provides an experiential, community-oriented way to build bridges between people of diverse backgrounds. I attended a Marshallese food demonstration hosted by Prof. Gallo and Chef Judy Tatio (pictured left with her fabulous fare) and used the delightful experience to inform my honors food presentation. Everything I

learned in this class left me wanting more! I loved learning about the agricultural revolution and how that monumental transition has shaped our global story. The ending is not yet written!

American National Government and Intro to Comparative Politics were transformative. Professor Evans spoke straight to my will, equipping me with practical tools and knowledge to be an engaged global citizen.
