The newspaper staff of the NorthWest Arkansas Community College Eagle View newspaper won 11 individual awards and a Newspaper of the Year award at the 2018 Arkansas College Media Association's Conference and Award Ceremony held April 6 at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia.

Ten Arkansas colleges and universities competed in newspaper, yearbook, magazine, radio, television, and on-line media contest categories.

NWACC was the only community college that participated in the contest with the 4-year universities and colleges. Along with the awards ceremony, guest speakers for each session at the conference talked to the students about their professions and how to grow from a student to a professional.

JooEun Seo won first place in editorial cartoon with her cartoon Bewilder-

ing Times. Betim won first place for his headline writing for "DREAMers Go Through Their Worst Nightmare Under Trump's Administration." Edward Matthews won first place for his feature writing "Earthquake 40 Floors Up."

Betim won second place for the category news photography with his photo that went with Arkansas Shows Solidarity to DACA Recipients. Matthews won a second place award for spots news photography with his photo that accompanied the story "DREAMers Go Through Their Worst Nightmare." Katrina Pernudi won second place in the entertainment section for "The Misadventures of Brad the College Kid."

"It was surprising because it was unexpected. It was very humbling to receive awards when you're not expecting them." senior reporter, Renato Betim, said.

Rebecca Davis won third place for an in-depth news story called "Cases Left Out in the Cold." Alaina Hartman won third place for her story

## ORT Offers Virtual Bus Passes

Even though NorthWest Arkansas Community College students, faculty and staff may ride Ozark Regional Transit busses for free (must show NWACC ID), ORT now has a virtual bus pass option available to its non-NWACC riders. According to the ORT website, the virtual bus passes are offered through Token Transit, a free app that is downloadable from the Apple App Store or from Google Play.

Once the app is downloaded on a smart phone, patrons are able to purchase the virtual passes via credit card, debit or pre-paid card. Next, patrons should select ORT, if the smart phone's location settings are on the app should suggest ORT automatically. Then select the type of bus pass you want and pay with a debit or credit card. Once the pass is purchased, it should show up in your Pass Wallet.

Patrons' first purchase via

the Token Transit app will get 50 percent off that initial purchase. However, it is important to note rides should not activate the pass until ready to ride the bus. Once the pass has been activated for that particular ride, show the bus driver the ticket on the smart



phone.

Another way to get the app is to text "TOKEN" to 41411 for a download link for the app. According to ORT, the fare box will remain in the buses and paper passes will still be available for people. The virtual pass option is

available to make it easier for the community to get passes to ride the bus.

Jose Novillo, a bus driver, has worked for ORT for six years. Novillo drives the morning shift of Route 490 Northbound toward Bentonville. He said the busiest time for riders is between 6:45 and 8:45 a.m.

He said the 6:45 a.m. service usually has about 15 to 20 riders while the 8:45 a.m. has about 25 to 30 people aboard the bus during those hours. The slowest day is Friday, Novillo said.

John Huff, another ORT driver, has the afternoon shift of Route 490. He said the busiest hour going south is at 4 p.m.

Novillo said ridership has decreased over the years. He said about five years ago, all the seats in the bus he drove were full plus about 26 extra

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## Pinwheel Event Alerts Public to Child Abuse

The Children's Advocacy Center of Benton County kicked off Child Abuse Awareness month with their annual Cherishing Children Pinwheel campaign April 2.

The pinwheels represent the 439 confirmed child abuse cases in Benton County last year.

Businesses and individuals who display pinwheels can contribute to CAC, but the campaign is more about awareness, said Melanie Halbrook, education specialist with Benton County CAC.

Benton County has the third highest number of reported child abuse cases in the state, and Washington County is second, Halbrook said. The high number of cases is in part due to the higher population in Northwest Arkansas, she said.

The Benton County CAC provides forensic interviews and medical exams, counseling, and other services for children and families.

Clients are referred the center by investigators after a report is accepted through the Child Abuse hotline and assigned to either the State Police or Department of Human Services, Halbrook said.

Most cases include physical or sexual abuse, she said, but the center also serves children who have witnessed violence, suffered neglect, or survived other trauma.

Families of children who have utilized the CAC may receive ongoing, comprehensive services through the agency, including personal and family counseling, emergency meal kits, and legal services.

Parents and caretakers of victimized children often suffer a crisis of their own throughout the process, and the advocates work to alleviate the stress of care takers and children throughout the process to minimize trauma, Halbrook said.

"Our goal is to get them on their healing journey," she said.

The Benton County CAC also provides trainings to individuals and organizations in the community. The trainings are free and open to anyone, but focus mainly on mandatory reporters of abuse, Halbrook said.

Once training, called Trauma to Resilience, helps professionals, including teachers and school counselors, to use trauma informed care in the classroom, she said.

“A lot of kids who have experienced trauma or live

in a traumatic environment have a hard time focusing in school,” Halbrook said.

The training focuses on equipping teachers and counselors with the skills to help children focus on education, rather than being swallowed by the trauma, she said.

The Benton Co. CAC has provided 20 trainings to over 1,300 people since January of 2018, she said.

Event Marks Homelessness Awareness Day

Fayetteville Mayor Lionel Jordan declared April 8 Homelessness Awareness Day at a march that day from 7Hills Homeless Shelter to the Fayetteville Town Center.

Around 100 people marched to the square to support the homeless population in Northwest Arkansas. Fayetteville native and University of Arkansas student Quinn Childress said he planned the march, called “Walk a Mile in My Shoes,” to assemble and motivate allies to end homelessness. He spent two months planning and organizing the march.

Childress gave a speech about the current issue of homelessness and affordable housing in Arkansas and the need for change. Childress, who is 22, said that he wants to make a difference in his life and others by trying to solve the issue of homelessness.

Most people like to remain in the bubble between them and society, to stay in their comfort zone, he said. If a person says they care about people but aren’t willing to help, they have to ask themselves if they truly do care, Childress said.

The Point-in-Time Count conducted in January of this year estimated that 406 people were experiencing home-

lessness in Northwest Arkansas. This count used the definition of homelessness set forth by the HEARTH Act of 2012, where homeless individuals’ “nighttime residence was a place not meant for human habitation, emergency shelter or transitional housing,” according to http://nwacoc.com.

A point-in-time census conducted by the Community and Family Institute of the University of Arkansas estimated that there are 2,951 homeless residents in Northwest Arkansas in March of 2017. This count included “counts of homeless students provided by Benton and Washington County school districts and a corresponding estimate of their parents/guardians... and an estimate of ‘invisible’ homeless persons derived from interviews conducted in soup kitchens, food pantries and day centers.”

Childress said he conceptualized the Walk a Mile in My Shoes march and ‘Community Project X’ last November. I thought that if I were on the corner, I’d want someone to be a voice for me, he said. He said he decided that he needed to take action. Childress said he plans to unveil his plan to end homelessness in NWA the second week of May, with an exact date to be decided.

“I want everyone to be successful; I want everyone to have opportunities; I want everyone to be sheltered,” Childress said.

Alvin Davis, an engineer who has been on the streets for three years, spoke at the march and shared the struggles and needs of the homeless community, often turning toward Mayor Jordan as he spoke.

During his time being homeless, he said he has met many professionals who have met the same fate.

He said that becoming homeless could happen to almost anyone in a heartbeat. A bad divorce, credit card debt, a loss in the family, or another unexpected event can send a person into a spiral. He said that people who live paycheck to paycheck are often one or two paychecks away of becoming homeless.

“Instead of shunning people who are homeless, give them a leg up,” Davis said.

He said if possible employers have any hint that an applicant is homeless they won’t be hired. If homeless people are offered jobs, they are often paid less than minimum wage, he said.

“People take advantage of us, because they know we need the job,” Davis said.

He looked toward the Mayor as he called for a work program for the homeless.

Jordan started his speech by talking about the homeless resource programs the city offers, including Hearth Housing and the \$160,000 Fayetteville allocated to 7Hills. He said that his goal was to ensure homelessness becomes a rare, brief and one-time event.

He looked toward Davis

early into his speech and said, “We will find anyone a job who wants to work.”

Jordan said he attended the march to hear individual stories of those experiencing homelessness and to “encourage everyone to work together to address the issues.”

“Our city’s goal is to continue to participate in the regional Continuum of Care and one day reach ‘functional zero,’ so that we have enough services in place to work with all of the needs of our homeless population,” Jordan said.

The idea of “service leadership” is connecting the resources across Northwest Arkansas, said Yolanda Fields, Fayetteville’s community resource director.

Fields said the city spends about \$600,000 per year on resources for the homeless. The city provides \$160,000 to fund 7hills, and the rest funds transitional and permanent supportive housing through the Hearth Home program, she said. Hearth Home is funded through HUD grants, which stipulate how the funding is spent.

Two grants are intended for permanent supportive housing for chronically homeless and disabled individuals one is for transitional and supportive housing, said Fields. HUD defines a person as chronically homeless if they have spent 12 months of the last three years homeless.

Since the Hearth Home program formed in February 2016, 79 adults and 94 children have been housed, Fields said. The program includes an individual case-worker, who meets with the client once a week, food pantries, and minimal household supplies, she said. They are currently working to establish a supply of furniture and other necessities to give clients once housed, Fields said.

The Special Needs Assistance Programs HUD grant requires applicants to create a continuum of care by joining cities and organizations. These coalitions ensure less duplication of services, according to HUDexchange.info. This funding requirement led to the creation of the Center for Collaborative Care and Hark!, which also streamlined Hearth Home’s process of care, Fields said.

Hearth Home used to get referrals from disjointed resources throughout the community but now receives all its referrals through Hark!, a program at the Center for Collaborative Care, she said.

Hark! is a social media style networking site that connects those in need with resource providers and provides community liaisons to help them navigate the different organizations. The site provides a profile, where users can indicate personal areas of need, share their stories, and securely store digital copies of personal items, according to harknwa.com. Users can reach out to a community liaison by phone or search through the organization and provider profiles.

Food Insecurity and Stress Haunt College Students

College students go hungry during their academic years according to the Wisconsin HOPE Lab and Temple’s Office of Institutional Research and Assessment.

Stephani Curtis, a mental health counselor at North-West Arkansas Community College, said financial difficulties and lack of food can cause high levels of stress.

Research conducted by the Wisconsin HOPE Lab and Temple’s Office of Institutional Research and Assessment shows that 36 percent of students at 66 surveyed colleges and universities do not get enough to eat.

“If a student is struggling with finances and does not have enough to eat, this will likely make it even more difficult to prioritize and focus on their academics,” Curtis said.

Becky Hudson, director of Student Life, at NWACC said to alleviate these issues, NWACC has a food pantry available for students and employees. “We have also have free personal counseling for students.”

In addition, Hudson said that in two and a half years, the food pantry has served over 700 students and employees.

During academic years, students can find themselves in various stressful situations, including lack of food. Curtis said there are different ways to combat stress. “Some

techniques that have been found to be effective include: practicing time management skills, exercise, organization (calendar/planners), healthy sleeping habits and routines, journaling, finding a balance between academic, social, and personal time, goal setting and support system,” she said.

Curtis said that it is important for students to keep a healthy and positive mentality under pressure “by setting limits for themselves and what they are capable of accomplishing in allotted amount of time and seek help when student starts feeling out of control of their own life.”

Hudson said are forms students can pick up at the Information Desk of the Student Center to get food every other week. There is no income checking. The forms should be turned in to room 225H in the Student Center by 3:30 p.m. on the Monday before distribution.

The next distribution is set for May 9 and 10 so the request form should be turned in May 7. The student needs to bring a student ID for enrollment verification.

“Most of us always have our doors open to students that may just need to get away for a few minutes or to talk. We are not counselors... only our counseling office offers that (counseling), but we are people that will listen or offer a space to get away for a minute,” said Hudson.

## A Strange Pair: When Two Sauces Meet

My girlfriend, Lorraine, hates enchiladas. She can't stand the taste or the smell of enchilada sauce. When she was a little girl, her mom would make them for her dad, and the smell of the sauce made her so sick that she refused to cook them or stay in the house when they were cooking.

Occasionally, I made them for dinner, but each time, she ate something else. Then, one day, she was on Pinterest and came across a recipe for barbecue chicken enchiladas.

The recipe called for corn and black beans, which made it unlike a typical enchilada dish. The enchiladas were described as "Mexican meets Kansas City"(Ali). Because of these differences, one night, I convince Lorraine to try the recipe.

The BBQ sauce sweetened the enchilada sauce and Lorraine could not taste it. For the first time in I don't know how long, Lorraine ate enchiladas and loved them.

- BBQ Chicken Enchiladas**  
Total Time: 45 minutes
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
  - 1 small red onion, peeled and diced
  - 1.5 pounds boneless skinless chicken breasts, diced into small 1/2-inch pieces *\*(can also cook and shred chicken)*
  - Salt and pepper
  - 1 (4 ounce) can diced green chilies
  - 1 (15.5 ounce) can black beans, rinsed and drained
  - ½ cup whole-kernel corn\* *(canned, fresh, or frozen)*
  - 1 (8-count) package large

- flour tortillas
  - 3 cups Mexican-blend shredded cheese
  - 1 1/4 cups red enchilada sauce, homemade or store-bought
  - ½ cup barbecue sauce, homemade or store-bought
  - Optional toppings: 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro, extra diced red onions
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In large skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add red onion and sauté for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add diced chicken and green chilies, and season with salt and pepper. Sauté for 6-8 minutes, stirring occasionally, or until the chicken is cooked through. Stir in beans and corn until combined. Remove from heat and set aside.

In a separate bowl, whisk together enchilada sauce and

BBQ sauce until combined. Set aside.

To assemble the enchiladas, lay out a tortilla on a flat work surface then spread two tablespoons of sauce over the surface of the tortilla.

Add a few spoonfuls of the chicken mixture, and then sprinkle with 1/3-cup cheese.

Roll up tortilla and place in a greased 9 x 13-inch baking dish. Repeat with the remaining ingredients and filling ingredients. Then spread the remaining enchilada sauce on top of the tortillas, and sprinkle on the remaining shredded cheese.

Bake uncovered for 20-25 minutes until the cheese is melted and the tortillas are crispy around the edges.

Remove from oven and serve immediately, garnished with chopped fresh cilantro and extra diced red onions if desired.

Yields 8 servings.

Ever frugal, my mother made a soup from leftovers after a week of meals. She used whatever meat and vegetables left in the refrigerator. It could have been a roast, chicken, or meatloaf, and any vegetables.

She combined the meat and vegetables, and she added other vegetables if there were not enough leftovers, in a stock pot with water and vegetable stock. She let the soup simmer all day on the stove.

The soup was delicious, and we enjoyed it every time she made it, along with her homemade sweet cornbread. Over a period of time, I have made some tweaks to the recipe to make it cheaper and easier

This Hodge-Podge Soup came to my mind in August of 1992. We were living in Miami, Florida (Kendall Area), when Hurricane Andrew came barreling down on South Florida like a roaring lion on a rampage.

After the hurricane passed,

the weather was extremely hot and sticky with no breezes.

The Kendall area was without electricity for about three and half weeks. Fortunately, we had a gas stove and oven and were able to prepare meals.

To save the meat and vegetables we had in the freezer and refrigerator, I cooked my mom's Hodge-Podge Soup for my family and neighbors. We put it in containers for delivery to our neighbors.

During this devastating time in our lives, neighbors came together during Hurricane Andrew.

**Hodge-Podge Soup**

- 2 lbs. lean hamburger meat browned and drained (See Note)
- 2-14.5 oz. cans tomato sauce
- 2 cans water (or substitute one can beef stock for water)
- 1 onion (medium chopped)
- 2-3 carrots (medium chopped)
- 8-10 red potatoes (quartered)
- 1 can sweet whole kernel corn, with liquid
- 1 can green beans, with liquid
- 1 can lima beans, with liquid
- Salt and Pepper to taste
- Fresh Chopped Parsley or 1

tablespoon of Parsley Flakes (Optional)

Brown the hamburger meat in a skillet until fully cooked and then drain off grease.

Place meat into large crock pot and then add the remaining ingredients.

Stir ingredients together until well mixed. Set crock pot on low and cook for 6-8 hours.

Dinner will be ready upon arrival home from work. Serve with sweet cornbread or other favorite bread and salad. Bon Appetite.

Yields 10-12 servings.

**Note:** Any type of meat can be substituted for the hamburger meat, and any vegetables desired may be added.

Hark! Satisfies the HUD requirement for a by-name list, also, Fields said.

“We can’t guarantee that no person will become homeless at any point,” Fields said.

She said that the coalition’s goal is to reach ‘functional zero,’ where the resources are available to house people immediately, so there isn’t a huge gap between losing stable housing and becoming independent or supported.

“We’re almost there with veterans,” she said. “We’re hoping that we’ll get there soon.”

Veterans currently make up 23 percent of the homeless population nationally, according to [nationalhomeless.org](http://nationalhomeless.org).

She said that the coalition is learning more about and gaining the resources to support each need that an individual and demographic might have. Now, with the Center for Collaborative

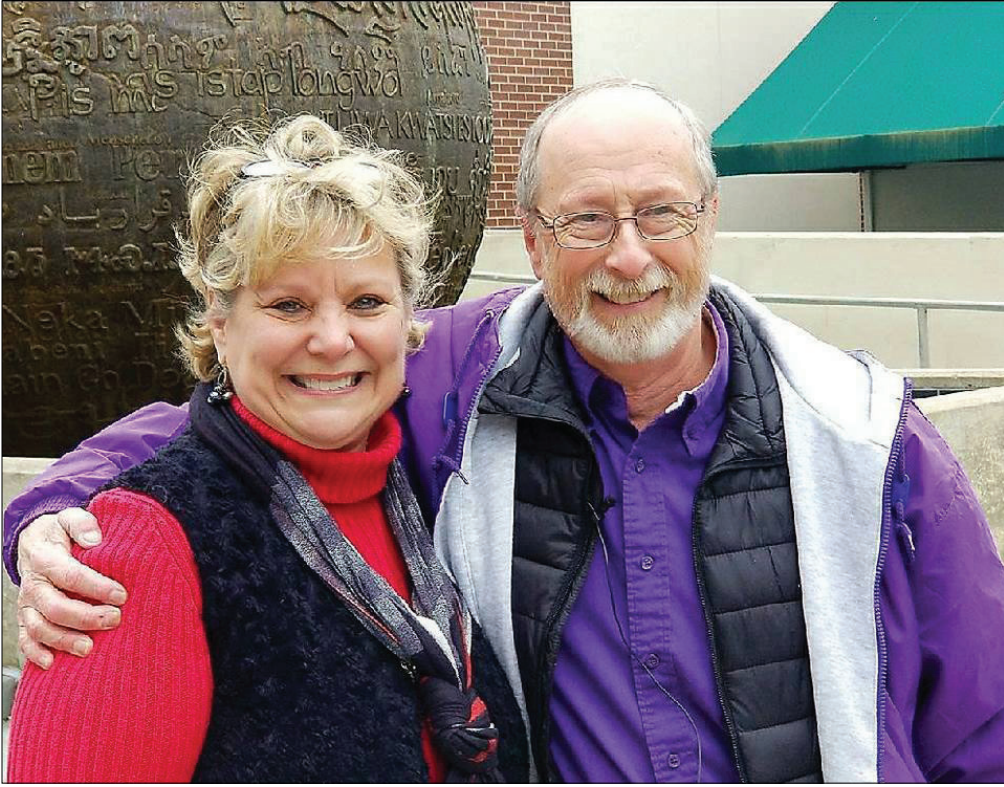

## Federal Judge Ruling is a Setback for President Trump Over DACA

A federal judge ruled to keep the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, also known as DACA, April 24, in the District of Columbia, according to a press release.

“I am so relieved that another judge has shown light to this DACA mess one more time,” said Jose Rodriguez, a DACA recipient.

Federal District Court Judge John D. Bates said that the Trump’s administration’s decision to terminate the DACA program is “unlawful.”

Bates gave the Department of Homeland and Security 90 days to explain its reasoning for terminating the program. After that, they “must accept and process new as well as renewal DACA applications,” Bates said.

Rodriguez said he is happy with the judge’s decision, but also concerned.

“I sure do hope that these 90 days go by fast. The Latino community that is affected by this sometimes is not well informed so they are subject to being scammed by those saying they can start a new DACA application when they know that they are not taking new applications. We need to get the word out to

the community are protect them from false information.”

This is the third time a judge has pushed back against Trump’s efforts to end DACA.


Federal judges in San Francisco and Brooklyn issued orders to keep the program in place, but neither of those decisions required the government to accept new applications.

“I hope that they do not see us as dollar signs but human beings. I hope for a pathway to citizenship or even at least a pathway to residency,” Rodriguez said.




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
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# Back for a New Season: LatinX Theatre Project

people were standing in the hall of the bus.

“In the past, we used to have three buses because it was so full,” Novillo said.

Novillo said he believes the decrease in ridership is because there is not enough advertisement about the bus services. He said he has met students who were not aware of the bus services offered by ORT. He also said he believes another reason the ridership has decreased is because of the recent upgrades to the I-49 highway lanes. Now that the third lane is open, he said he thinks more people are using their cars to get to school.

He said he wants to remind students of the benefits of taking the bus, including saving gas money, completing homework while riding the bus saves time, and saving time and money by not having to purchase a parking permit or circling the parking lot looking for a place to park.

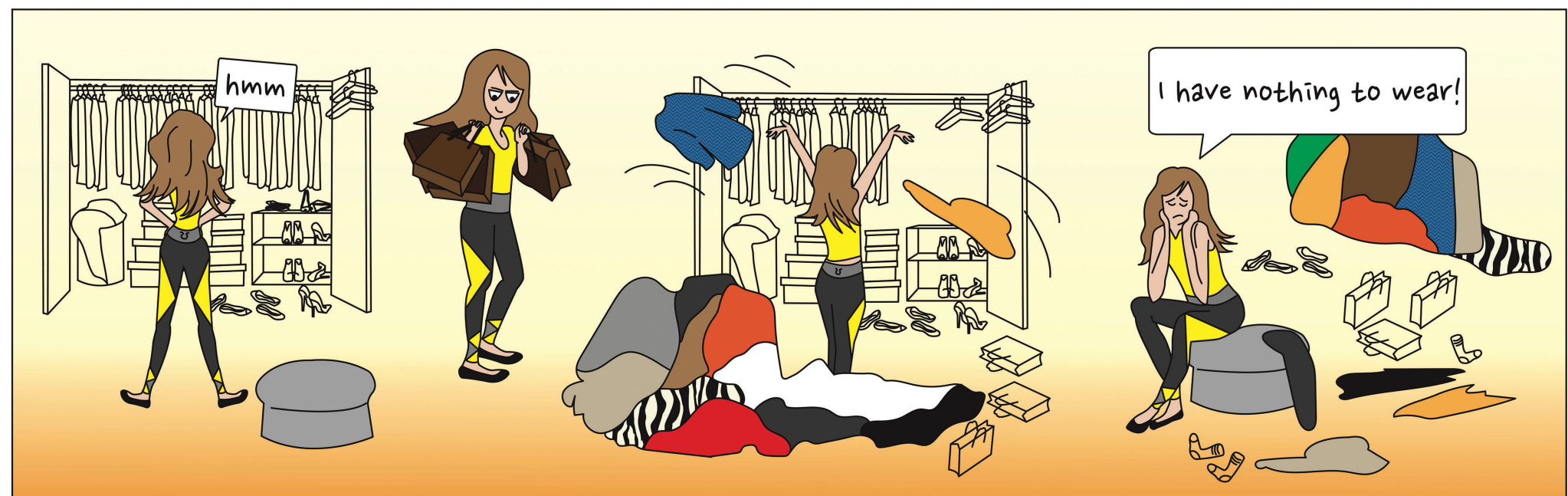
