

Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society is a premier international organization that recognizes the achievements of students attending colleges offering associate degrees.

In early April, NorthWest Arkansas Community College President Evelyn E. Jorgenson was awarded the Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction for her work and dedication to NWACC and its students. Phi Theta Kappa received little attention here at NWACC until 2013 when Jorgenson was appointed to NWACC and knew it was important

to revitalize the Phi Theta Kappa. She led the charge to make it a five-star chapter. "Phi Theta Kappa is very important," she said. "We must recognize students who are doing well. We've got to give them the opportunity to earn scholarships, and it's all about honoring students and their efforts."

With this, Phi Theta Kappa was re-charged at NWACC. The Shirley B. Gordon Award is offered once

in the career of a college president and is based on recommendations from the students. NWACC students nominated Dr. Jorgenson for this award. The 5th annual Bentonville Film Festival, to be held May 7-11 in downtown Bentonville, has taken on a secondary mission of sorts. They want to see young adults at the diversity and inclusion focused festival.

One way they hope to accomplish this mission is to let students know about the many activities, besides watching movies, available at BFF, many of which are free to attend, but need a ticket for seating.

According to a letter emailed to area high schools and universities, those activities include exploring the exhibit Pioneers: First Women Filmmakers at the 21C Hotel; interacting with the Check Your Blind Spots Tour bus to reveal unconscious bias; walking through Inclusion Town to pick up free products and food samples; visiting Puppy Village to see if a new friend is waiting; and tearing up the bike trails by joining the Women Shred event.

Students who are future filmmakers can get a taste by participating in Samsung Create, which gives student filmmakers a chance to create 60-second videos during the festival.

Eagle View staff traveled to Russellville in early April to attend the Arkansas College Media Association 2019 conference and awards ceremony.

Arkansas' students from colleges and public universities met at Arkansas Tech University on April 5. Student staff members who participate in newspaper, yearbook, television, magazine, online and radio attended the annual conference.

Student staff members and advisors were greeted and then attended sessions showing them insight into their careers.

Lunch was served in Arkansas Tech's West Dining Room where keynote speaker Representative Mark Lowery discussed his work on the student journalist protection bill, which protects the college student journalist's freedom of expression.

After lunch, the awards ceremony began as competition winners were announced. The awards for student staff members who entered their work into individual competition or into categories of general excellence were honored at the presentation ceremony.

Six of Eagle View student staff members won nine awards in the newspaper categories: Alaina Hartman won honorable mention for Newspaper In-Depth News and

The Love of Aviation Women Pilots Land in State for Annual Air Race Classic

Jean Wallace, ESL Level Five instructor at NWACC's Adult Education Center, has been flying for more than 32 years. A year ago, she became a member of The Ninety-Nines, a women's pilot group.

The Ninety-Nines was founded in 1929 by Amelia Earhart and Arkansas native, Louise Thaden, along with 115 other female pilots. Their goal was to provide mutual support to one another, further female advancement in the aviation field, and create a central office to keep files on women aviators. In 1975, their dream became a reality and an international headquarters was established in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The organization that was once comprised of only 117 members has grown to encompass 44 countries and has a membership of approximately 6,019 female pilots.

The same year, 1929, the Air Race Classic launched under the name Women's Air Derby and later became known as the Powderpuff Derby. This first race had a registration of 20 women aviators including Louise Thaden and Amelia Earhart. The race spanned from Santa Monica, California, to Cleveland, Ohio, where

Thaden took home the title of the first winner of the transcontinental race. By 2002, the race had been transformed into the Air Race Classic and received a non-profit 501(c) (3) as an educational program standing. The race registration of teams vary from colligate teams, Ninety-Nines members, and women who love to fly. The race now spans 2,400 statute miles in length and has become an international race. This year the race starts June 18 in Jackson, Tennessee, and ends in Welland, Ontario, on June 21. To achieve this goal, the racers must plan their course to factor in take-off at dawn, fly, as far as they can, and to ensure they are

on the ground at a designated stop by sunset. This year the race will be stopping at Saline County Airport (KSUZ) here in Arkansas. The racers will be stopping at KSUZ June 18 and June 19.

The Arkansas chapter of The Ninety-Nines is hosting this stop and is charged with providing the racers with a memorable experience as the racers will vote on the best stop at the end of the race. This is not Wallace's first-time volunteering but her third. She held the position of timer which entails keeping the official time of the racers as they fly by a specific marker. Additionally, Heather Hodge, a current NWACC student obtaining her Associates

of Science degree in General Business, is the advertising and public relations coordinator for the Arkansas chapter of The Ninety-Nines. The Ninety-Nines welcome the entire community to come out and support this historic race. For more information: ark.ninety-nines@gmail.com.

Wallace said she is not aware of any pilots on campus, but is sure there must be quite a few. To them, she said, "Don't be afraid to try it." Wallace inspires her ESL students by giving assignments to the women aviation pioneers.

"You realize you are part of something big and you really want to do your best to influence others."

was she said, "It is incredibly meaningful to me because, first of all, there's an international recognition. This year there were only 17 college presidents in the United States that got recognized, so it is very selective, so obviously anything that is very selective and recognizes contribution towards students and student success; it's very important to me. It's everything, but the biggest part of the honor is knowing that there are students here at NWACC that believe me to be worthy of this Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction, and I really appreciate it."

In receiving the Shirley B. Gordon award, Jorgenson

said she believes what she is doing within the college will be reinforced and will continue. She said she would love to remain at NWACC as long as they will have her.

She thought back to advice she was once given, believe in yourself and don't be afraid to take risks, and she said, "All students have much more potential than they realize they do, and I would encourage students to work hard, believe in themselves and not to be afraid to succeed. They have to learn to believe in themselves and not be afraid to take risks. To put themselves out there. Try something that's a little bit scary but you have the potential to do it. Don't be afraid of success."

Phi Theta Kappa's Shirley

B. Gordon Award is the most respected award given to presidents of community colleges, and it honors Gordon who was Phi Theta Kappa's longest running Board of Directors chair member. She founded and was longtime president of Highline Community College in Washington and she was only the third female to receive the American Association of Community College Leadership Award. A nationally esteemed educator, Gordon received International Honorary Membership in PTK which established the Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction.

The PTK organization helps outstanding students as they grow to be scholars and

leaders within their colleges and communities, by offering scholarships, encouraging students' success and recognizing their effort.

Ninety percent of members go on to four-year universities and/or receive their associate's degrees, way above the national average of thirty-eight percent. Forty-six percent of these student will complete their bachelor's degrees or higher.

The Phi Theta Kappa is a very prestigious organization that helps students excel. Phi Theta Kappa also recognizes the presidents of the colleges who show strong support of students and stand out in their academic achievements as well as leadership and service within their colleges.

a wall mosaic.

But let's not forget, this is a film festival. BFF will honor American Horror Story actress and Drama Desk Award winner Jamie Brewer with the "See It, Be It" Award, "which highlights a rising and influential voice in the landscape of diversity and inclusion in media," according to a press release from the festival.

Brewer is the first woman with Down syndrome to walk the runway at New York Fashion week and has had major television and cinematic roles.

BFF is co-founded by the Geena Davis Institute of Gender in Media and offers free movie screenings and panel discussions as part of its mission to establish a diverse, equal and representative platform across all media mediums.

The BFF Foundation uses research, education, mentoring and industry partnerships to create a well-balanced and well-represented atmosphere in the media community, according to the Bentonville Film Festival's website.

Panel events take place May 8 - 10.

Wednesday panels include Geena and Friends, comprised of women in film reenacting male scenes through a female lens; This Changes Everything, a gen-

der influenced controversial documentary; and AspireTV -- Looking Through a Brown Lens, discussing the creative influences and production of black culture in films.

Thursday discussions include Let's Make a Deal, a conversation over women's struggle to fund and distribute their films; and Queer & Here to Stay, looking at queer representation in film and media.

Friday panels include Indigenous Voices, examining indigenous inclusion in stories and film; If She Can See It, She Can Be It, empowering women in their business endeavors and how to cultivate success; The New Mr. Mom: Re-defining Traditional Family Roles, discussing the conventional and redefined role of men and women in the family; and Able & Willing, emphasizing the need for disability representation in films, according to a line-up published by the BFF.

Each year, the festival selects films based on six submission categories: U.S. Narrative Feature Film; U.S. Documentary Feature Film; International Narrative Feature Film; International Documentary Feature Film; Short Film; and Episodic Series. The films should highlight an underrepresented group, whether that be women, people of color, people of the

LGBTQ community, people over the age of 50, people with disabilities or veterans, according to the Bentonville Film Festival's "Submission Criteria and Guidelines." This year's festival will feature 15 narrative films, 13 documentaries and nine episodic projects, 81 percent of which are female directed and 68 percent directed by and feature people of color, according to a BFF press release.

A special screening of Tom Donahue's documentary "This Changes Everything," produced by Geena Davis, will kick-off the festival. This film brings light to the systematic basis of gender discrimination in and outside of the work industry; it features Meryl Streep, Reese Witherspoon, Natalie Portman and other TIMES UP activists.

Joey Travolta's "Carol of the Bells" and Haroula

Rose's "Once upon a River" will make their world premieres as Centerpiece Selections of the festival on May 10.

Travolta's film stars Breaking Bad's RJ Mite, Donna Prescow, Lee Purcell and Donna Mills. Mite's character looks for his biological mother, and when he discovers she is developmentally disabled, his wife must accompany Mite through trials and healing.

Rose's "Once upon a River" is based on the best-selling novel by Bonnie Jo Campbell, which tells the story of a woman's trek along the Stark River. This film features Kenadi DelaCerna, John Ashton and Tatanka Means.

From Science to Rock 'N' Roll: Hill Enjoys It All

Dr. Jacques Hill is not only a biology professor at Northwest Arkansas Community College, but a cold-blooded, rock 'n' roll, scientific enthusiast. Hill grew up in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, but spent his formative years living in New Jersey and many other areas since. While attending Rider College in New Jersey from 1981-1986, he completed his Bachelor of Science and went on to work as an environmental consultant for a few years.

After transferring to Rutgers University in 1991, he completed his Master of Science in Ecology and Evolution in 1993. Following his master's, he worked as a wildlife biologist for Arizona Game and Fish.

He now holds a doctorate in biology that he received from the University of Arkansas in 2004. During both his master's and doctoral degrees, he completed required

field research on venomous snakes.

Hill said, "You don't have to do a master's right after your undergrad years. I didn't finish my Ph.D. until I was about 42. The work I did in between degrees helped me know what direction to go in, or not to go in, next."

Coming of age during the Vietnam war sparked an interest for Southeast Asia in Hill's mind. He began to try Thai food, meet Thai people and with his appeal for science, was eventually drawn to the tropical ecology that Thailand has to offer. Following his academic years, he travelled to Thailand to complete post-doctoral work on snakes in tropical forests and published a scientific journal covering his research. With over 30 years of snake ecology research, Hill has radio tracked many species of venomous snakes in the U.S. and in Thailand, while additionally studying the bacteria that lives in their gut.

He now mentors graduate students in Thailand who ra-

dio track king cobras, monocled spitting cobras and some other snake species.

Since then, Hill has spent countless years living and working in Thailand. He said he fell in love with the cul-

ture, people, beaches, forests and of course, the food in Thailand. Through his own company, Hill created a Thailand Study Abroad opportunity for collegiate students who share his love for tropi-

cal ecosystems, or maybe just oriental food.

Hill's love for biology began with simply being outdoors and studying natural beings like animals. "Now I love all aspects of biology,

including things like how DNA works and that we can't see it with our eyes. I am fascinated by understanding how organisms, including humans, work," he said. Although he is not explicitly religious, Hill said he finds the world to be profoundly miraculous.

Among Hill's many other interests and hobbies, he is a lover of music as well. While teaching at NWACC, Hill began to study guitar on campus to take his practice to a new level. Although he had been playing for 30 years, he said had never taken lessons and did not see much progress. By studying guitar at NWACC, Hill saw vast improvement.

"Recently, I have been able to play music that I have loved since I was a teenager and I never imagined I could play it. Doing something you never thought you could do is one of the most satisfying experiences. I am not a great guitar player, but I am getting better and that is fine with me," Hill said.





“Lara Croft Go” is 40 Levels of Fun

“*Lara Croft Go*” is an isometric puzzle action-adventure video game developed by Square Enix Montreal and published by Square Enix. Released on Aug. 27, 2015, and Dec. 2-4, 2016, for PlayStation 4, PlayStation Vita, iOS, Microsoft Windows, Android, Linux, macOS, and Windows Phone.

“*Lara Croft Go*” offers a fun, unique gameplay experience using the “*Tomb Raider*” franchise as its basis. Developer Square Enix Montreal is a studio founded to work on a game in the “*Hitman*” franchise that was repurposed into creating mobile games for Western audiences. They would eventually make a turn-based puzzle game based on the “*Hitman*” series titled “*Hitman Go*,” which released to a positive response from audiences who found the game to be challenging with great puzzles and featuring unique visuals.

With “*Hitman Go*” being a success, Square Enix Montreal sought to repeat that success with the “*Tomb Raider*” franchise. “*Lara Croft Go*” was made utilizing the Unity game engine, a popular engine for porting games to mobile devices.

“*Lara Croft Go*” does not

have much in terms of a story. The main protagonist, Lara Croft, is an English archaeologist searching throughout jungles, caves, and even a magical mirror, breaking all of reality for powerful artifacts.

That’s pretty much it in terms of story. However, what the game lacks in story makes up for it in gameplay. Lara can go through several different environments each with a different layout and obstacles in the form of snakes, giant spiders, buzz saws, boulders, and more. While levels in “*Hitman Go*” were restricted to a horizontal plane, “*Lara Croft Go*” adds vertical movement with steps, cliff faces, and climbable terrain incorporated into the level design.

There are five chapters and 40 levels to the entire game. As the game progresses, the puzzles laced in the levels start to become more and more complex. It got to the point where I kept dying on certain levels and I replayed them learning how to move Lara in certain paths while

avoiding the creatures and obstacles of that specific area. Each enemy has a specific movement pattern: the giant spiders copy the same moves as Lara, for example. There are weapons and booby traps placed in certain areas Lara can use to her advantage. Spears, her handguns, and trap doors are just some of the creative ways of getting rid of these obstacles. Throughout the game, Lara will find hidden treasure the player will have to recover in certain levels. Getting the required number of pieces for a larger artifact or jewel rewards the player with additional costumes from other “*Tomb Raider*” games, which is pretty cool since some of her unlockable costumes look better than the official outfit.

“*Lara Croft Go*” is a fun adventure that I probably will only play once. I like a lot of puzzle games but this game is way too short, with total game time of about four hours and there’s not much replay value in it besides unlocking the additional outfits. The visual polygonal art style applied to the level designs and environments stands out from the other “*Tomb Raider*” games in the franchise. I recommend giving “*Lara Croft Go*” a try since the puzzles are fairly challenging, but wait for a price drop on this one.






