College Offers CDL Training

Board of Trustees Gets Program Update at September Meeting

She said a grant of \$288,700 from the Arkansas Department of Higher Education was signed into acceptance May 18 and the summer was spent planning out the two phases of the program.

Phase I includes theory training which will include up to 40 hours of lectures and demonstrations of basic operations of a Commercial Motor Vehicle, safe operating procedures, vehicle systems, reporting malfunctions, and other non-driving activities.

Students will also have access to the "L3 Harris" TransSim™ simulator. Aldridge said "four hours of

simulated training [is about an] hour of class training" and the simulator has "120 robust curriculum scenarios" capable of preparing students for the unexpected.

There is no minimum of hours required to pass, but a student must score at least 80% on the final assessment.

Phase II of the program will start in Spring 2022 and will expand on the same theory training topics taught in Phase I with addition to Behind-The-Wheel training which will involve the actual operation of

NWACC Marks 4% Drop in Enrollment

NorthWest Arkansas Community College President Evelyn Jorgenson issued a statement on Sept. 16, 2021, about enrollment numbers dropping 4% for this fall semester. This decline in headcount shows the difference between Fall 2020 semester's headcount of 7,411, according to the NWACC Factbook, and this fall semester's unofficial headcount of 7,081.

When asked about the leading cause in the declining numbers of enrollment, Dale Montgomery, dean of students, said one main factor is "primarily Covid." Some of the sub factors that bleed from the problem of COVID-19 is the loss of jobs and family members.

As some college tuitions

across the nation continue to rise, NWACC's tuition rate has stayed the same. Affordability, specifically for NWACC, is mainly correlated to the loss of jobs and family members that had once been supporting students.

Though COVID-19 seems to be one of the leading factors to this trend of decreasing numbers, Jorgenson also listed other contributing factors such as lower birth rates, student loan issues, and lack of a support system.

Jorgenson said the average age of students in college is around 24, and by most accounts, many have become independent. Independent students, by nature, just have a much harder time in finding the correct balance of work, home duties, and school.

However, not everything has been impacted as negatively by the coronavirus pandemic. An unofficial report from Liz Kapsner, director of

communications at NWACC, said that although enrollment figures went down at the Bentonville college campus, there is an opposite figure for the NWACC-Washington County Center location.

The report states that there was an increase of 354 enrollments compared to last fall. The student headcount for this campus location has doubled compared to the previous fall semester.

There were also concerns regarding the decrease in credit hours and their effect on the school's budget for bills and paychecks for teachers.

According to Todd L. Kitchen, vice president for Student Services, the school's budget has "built in some contingencies...that will allow us to adjust if our enrollment was slightly lower than we anticipated."

Although a lot of services offered

Food Pantry Seeks Donations

Disbursements Occur Twice a Month

The NWACC Food Pantry provides an important service to the college's students, faculty and staff and is in need of donations to replenish the pantry's shelves, according to an emailed public announcement from NWACC.

The pantry is low on several items and is accepting all non-perishable items. Items needed include canned chicken, tuna, ham, beef, peanut butter and jelly, macaroni and cheese, pasta, hot and cold cereal (dry and individual serving, and hot such as oatmeal), canned vegetables, canned beans and canned fruit.

The pantry, according to the college's website, also has a refrigerator and freezer, so it can take fresh produce, dairy and frozen good donations as well.

Donated items may be dropped off at the food pantry located next to the Student Information Center in the Becky Paneitz Student Center. Donations will be accepted 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday.

Monetary donations are also accepted and may be left with

When Truth is Stranger Than Fiction

NWACC Professor Publishes Graphic Novel Exploring Crescent Hotel History

NorthWest Arkansas Community College Professor Sean Fitzgibbon explores the bizarre history of the Crescent Hotel in his recently completed 240-page nonfiction graphic novel, "What Follows Is True: Crescent Hotel."

The hotel in Eureka Springs, Arkansas, is considered one of 13 most haunted hotels in the United States, according to a Sept. 8, 2020, article on www.travelandleisure.com, with a host of unearthly residents mentioned by name on the hotel's nightly ghost tour. Much of its purported paranormal activity can be traced back to the two years it operated as The Baker Cancer Clinic, a fraudulent depression-era cancer hospital run by Norman Baker.

Baker — inventor, magician, radio announcer, and peddler of faux-pharmaceuticals — bought the failing hotel in 1937, promising a

revolutionary cure for cancer in the "Switzerland of America," according to the Crescent Hotel website.

Instead, he amassed a fortune

charging exorbitant sums to desperate patients, who were then injected with his proprietary (albeit useless) formula, an insidious blend of watermelon seed, brown corn silk, alcohol, and carbolic acid.

Many patients died under his care. Years later, after Baker was imprisoned for fraud, the Crescent Hotel reopened as a resort and spa, but ghostly visions of staff, nurses, and patients are reported to this day.

Beginning with Fitzgibbon's first childhood visit to the Crescent Hotel, his book blends classic illustration and fully-painted panels with oral histories, newspaper articles, and Baker's biography to elucidate this historical event and the monsters of yesteryear.

On Oct. 1 Fitzgibbon launched a month-long Kickstarter campaign

Students Ride ORT Buses Free for Remainder of 2021

Students at NorthWest Arkansas Community College will ride Ozark Regional Transit buses for free until the end of the year.

The Zero-Fare program, first initiated in 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic, will continue through 2021 all thanks to a grant given to ORT through the Walton

Family Foundation.

However, in January 2022, students will need to purchase ride passes via the Token Transit mobile app. A monthly pass for students will be \$15.

Route 490, aka NWACC Express, takes students to both Benton and Washington county campuses. Route 490 is made up of multiple stops that are available in the mornings and evenings. The route information can

be downloaded as a PDF through ORT's website.

There are two interactive maps on ORT's website, which give bus riders real time updates of their bus's location. If the bus rider doesn't have access to the interactive maps, they can call (479)756-5901 ext. 2 for more information.

ORT offers free Wi-Fi to all its passengers and the Wi-Fi's name and password is at the front of each bus. The Wi-Fi

a CMV. In BTW training, students will learn basic vehicle controls and master basic maneuvers of a CMV and operation of the vehicle will be conducted on a range or public road. The physical operation of the vehicle cannot be replaced with the simulator. The driver instructor will

determine a driver's proficiency at the end of the program. Phase II will extend the program to a total of 140 to 160 hours of training.

The program is open for licensed drivers 18 years and older who plan to seek out a Class A, B, or C license.

Those already with a CDL can participate in the program if they want to refresh

their training or keep up with new federal guidelines beginning February 2022.

There has been an estimation of a growth of occupations of about 6% that will go up through 2028 according to the nationwide BLS.gov. The American Trucking Association said there will be about one million jobs through 2029, and motor vehicle op-

erators are projected to grow even higher with a need to fill about 4,600 positions beyond current news, according to AR.gov website.

to fund the printing of his graphic novel. Kickstarter is a crowdfunding platform enabling community support for creative projects, and Fitzgibbon said if his funding goals are met, a full-color hardcover copy, along with prints and original artwork, will be available for purchase.

This publication is the culmination of 15 years of research and a lifetime of curiosity.

"We live on a strange planet," Fitzgibbon said, "and I love to explore."

There are positive aspects to life, but also darkness, weirdness, and he said he isn't afraid to explore themes that intrigue and disturb. Fitzgibbon said he loves to travel to exciting places with unique and assorted histories and uses these experiences as inspiration for his characteristically dark, atmospheric watercolors and multimedia artwork, creating tangible objects — physical art and books — that connect people to a story.

pares the creative process to growing a tree: water it every day, nurture and cultivate it, and it will one day come to fruition.

While this publication marks the end of a long creative process for Fitzgibbon, it is also the beginning of a collection of nonfiction work exploring other strange-but-

true places and stories.


