Section 1: In what ways did the Program help you "demonstrate engagement," "cultivate curiosity," and "explore perspectives" (community, curiosity, and diversity)?

I came to NWACC after I graduated from high school. I was excited, but also nervous before my first day of college. I did not know what college life was like, and I wondered how I could make my two years at college meaningful. In my first semester, I started getting involved in different student organizations and clubs while taking six courses at the same time. One day I noticed a large sign for the Honors Program in one of the buildings and it made me interested in the Honors Program. I visited the website to learn more about it and realized that it could be a great way to gain further experience.

In my second semester at NWACC, I was fortunate to have the chance to join the Honors Program. It took me a long time to decide whether to register for my first honors course. As a student whose native language is not English, I was nervous about the honors course will be too difficult. I was worried that it would be a big challenge for me to take an Honors course, and I was unsure what I would do if I failed. But after thinking about it for a few days, I decided to give it a try. I soon realized that the smaller class size gave me more opportunities to speak and share ideas. I felt more comfortable and that encouraged me to participate more. It also helped me to hear my classmates' ideas and thoughts on a particular essay or topic, and this opportunity strengthened my sense of diversity and critical thinking. The three honors courses I have taken helped my ability to think outside the box, explore new ideas and other perspectives. For example, in professor Chesne's English Composition class, I wrote a paper on a topic I was not very familiar with. Instead of simply completing the assignment for a grade, I tried to go deeper, seek out more sources and learn more than before. That experience helped me to be curious and motivated to learn beyond the class. In my Programming Logic I class, I had different and more complicated assignments than other students, and these assignments challenged me to write more complex code and understand programming logic more deeply. They also gave me a chance to see how other students think and solve problems, which helped me expand the way I think. Moreover, I attended a speaker event related to society and culture during Spring Art and Culture Festival, which opened my eyes to new ideas and inspired me to think more critically.

The small class size in honors courses also made me feel more engaged and build closer friendships. We had great conversations that were not just about schoolwork but also about interesting topics in life and community. I had also participated in several Honors Program meetings, and we talked about volunteering, community services, etc. This gave us more opportunities to give back to the community by volunteering to clean street and use our knowledge to help people someday. For instance, in my Programming Logic I course, I learned Python and our assignments are related to real-world scenario problems. One of the assignments involved creating a program that could encode and decode barcodes, which made me felt directly connected to real life. These projects made learning feel relevant and encouraged me to stay curious and passionate about gaining new skills in the future.

Section 2: How did this program prepare you for a university (or for a workplace, if you aren't transferring at this point)? What hard or soft skills will you take with you?
